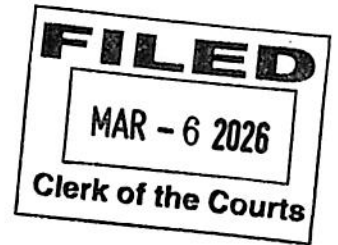

ORDER OF INTERIM SUSPENSION

1. Robert M. Brech, Executive Director of the Supreme Court Office of Professional Conduct (OPC), has presented to the Committee his verified Petition for Interim Suspension, pursuant to Section 16.A(3) of the Supreme Court Procedures Regulating Professional Conduct of Attorneys at Law (2011) (the "Procedures"), alleging Respondent Zoe Charise Jackson, Arkansas Bar No. 2022257, presently poses a substantial threat of serious harm to the public and to her clients if she continues to practice law.

2. The Arkansas Supreme Court Committee on Professional Conduct (the "Committee"), pursuant to the mandate of Section 16 of the Procedures, finds the allegations of the petition are "serious misconduct", and involve alleged violations of the Arkansas Rules of Professional Conduct.

3. The Committee further finds that an interim suspension of Respondent's privilege to practice law under the authority of her Arkansas law license shall be imposed pursuant to Section 7E(3)(c)(iii), of the Procedures (2011).

4. This Order is based on the analysis of the factors the Court set in *Tapp v. Ligon*, 2013 Ark. 259.

5. The first of the *Tapp* factors is whether the public will suffer irreparable harm unless the order of suspension issues.

6. The second of the *Tapp* factors is whether the threatened injury to the public

outweighs whatever damage the proposed order may cause the attorney temporarily suspended from the practice of law.


7. The third *Tapp* factor is whether the interim suspension is adverse to the public interest.

8. The fourth and final *Tapp* factor asks whether there is a substantial likelihood, based on all available evidence, that a significant sanction will be imposed on the attorney at the end of any pending disciplinary proceedings.

9. Based on the evidence in this matter, there is a substantial likelihood that the Office of Professional Conduct will meet its preponderance of the evidence burden in proving that Zoe Charise Jackson violated the Arkansas Rules of Professional Conduct and a significant sanction is likely to result.

It is therefore **ORDERED** that Respondent Zoe Charise Jackson be, and she hereby is, **SUSPENDED** from the practice of law within this jurisdiction immediately upon the filing of this Order with the Clerk of the Arkansas Supreme Court.
